Course Description: This course will cover the essential skills needed to create responsive websites, with a focus on using HyperText Markup Language (HTML) and Cascading Style Sheets (CSS). Students will be introduced to the concepts, foundations, syntax and structure of HTML and CSS. Additional topics include the use of File Transfer Protocol (FTP) to publish websites and validation to web standards established by the World Wide Web Consortium (W3C) and other organizations.

Course Objectives:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student should be able to:

1. Explain how to create sites that are compliant with current W3C (World Wide Web Consortium) standards in Web development.
2. Create valid and semantically correct HTML pages.
3. Organize website files and FTP them to the Web.
4. Create valid HTML tables.
5. Create absolute, relative and anchor links.
6. Apply cascading styles to an HTML document through inline CSS, internal style sheet or external style sheet.
7. Test and troubleshoot HTML and CSS.
8. Create Web forms using HTML and style them with CSS.
9. Apply responsive web design principles

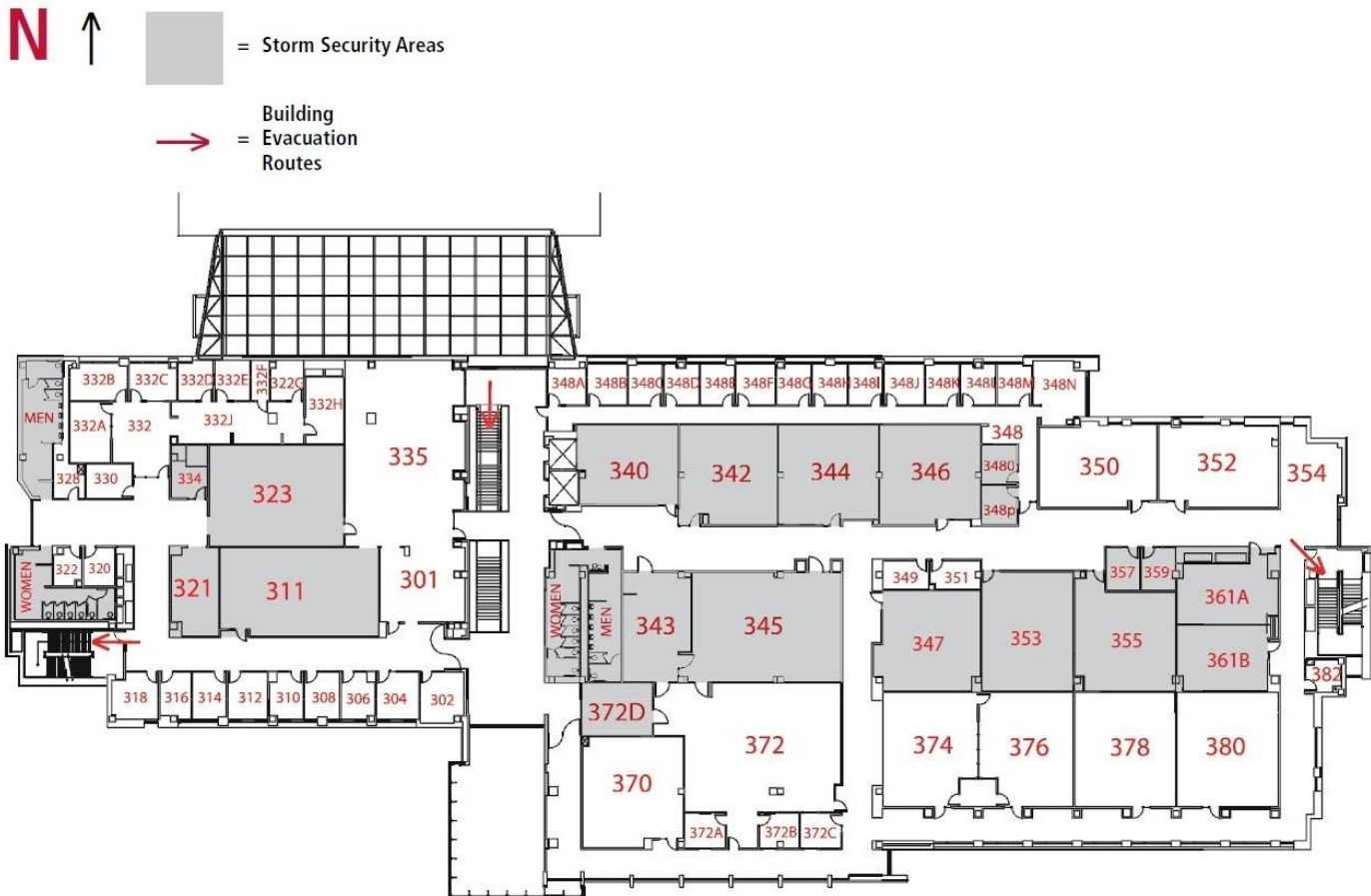
